Our biggest problem animal on our rural property just out of the Raglan township is feral, dumped and even domestic cats. It is very unpleasant having to trap and dispose of feral and stray cats - we receive no support from the WDC or Waikato Regional Council to manage this pest animal. Our many neighbours have many cats who are regularly hunting in our native bush or around our fenced and planted waterways. We knew we had a problem so we have been using a trail cam to see how bad it is and it's mortifying - we have feral, stray and domestic cats hunting the ducks, pheasants, quail and turkeys and that's not even looking into the damage they're doing to the many native species. PLEASE put some rules around cat ownership ie apply the same rules we have for dogs to cats - I'm sure my neighbours wouldn't be impressed with my dog wandering and hunting on their properties. Thanks.

I think it's a reasonable way to manage this but I don't agree with the unlimited amount of beehives in a rural area - even on our rural property we have had issues with nuisance bees due to the massive amount of apiaries in the district. Thankfully this has dropped due to the low price of honey but it's resulted in a massive increase in wasp numbers which we now also need to control ourselves (another pest to add to the list) and there is some evidence that huge numbers of beehives in an area decreases diversity in pollinators and competes with our native nectar feeding birds ie Tui and Kaka.





I am a beekeeper in Hamilton, on a property 900sqm, and have 12 beehives. Hamilton City has no limits for the number of hives, or locations, which are dealt with by Animal

Control on a case by case basis. In my 7 years of beekeeping, I do not know of any urban beekeeper who was unable to resolve any nuisance issue with neighbours. I believe there should be no quantity limits, and no boundary restrictions. Trying to locate hives 3 or 5 meters from a boundary is almost impossible on most urban properties. The only restriction that could maybe be included, is a 1.8 meter fence on any fenceline to a neighbouring property, behind the hives. When bees leave the hive, they will fly up and over whatever fence is there, and stay at that height, until a higher obstacle is found. Therefore it does not matter how close the hives are to that fence. As I said, Hamilton City has no restrictions at all, and I am aware that there are 2000+ hives across the city, with only a very small handful of complaints, that are always resolved with conversation with neighbours, and the occasional jar of honey. I have 13 direct neighbours, and none of them have any issues with my 12 beehives. Please don't make beekeeping restrictive and over complicated. It is not necessary. A few years ago I wrote an article about each Council's beekeeping rules, and about 60% had almost no restrictions. The rest did, and the consensus from beekeepers is that it makes beekeeping so difficult to keep to restricted numbers when you have to split hives for swarm prevention. It becomes unworkable to only have 2 hives.

Roosters causing continual nuisance, crowing at all times of the day and night. Roosters should be banned from ResRurDwe and similar areas as houses and properties are often still very close together and the noise of roosters travels a long way.

I've been living with one rooster approx 60 or so metres from my house in one direction and multiple other roosters maybe between 500-1000mtrs in the other direction, they wake me up early hours of the morning, I have heard crowing at all times of the day and night, from 11pm at night to as early as 3am in the morning. In my opinion roosters should only be kept on larger rural areas with no other houses for at least a km or more away.

There is one instance I know of where numerous roosters are kept on a property, on the boundry with a house directly next door. Just because an area is 'rural' it doesn't mean people should have to live with this type of nuiscence. 'Rural' isn't the same as it used to be with large blocks of land and no houses nearby.

Serious ResRurDwe should be treated the same as country living when it comes to roosters. They cause an immense amount of stress and disturbed sleep with no end in site.

7.5 Racing pigeons

- Note: Clauses 7.5.1. to 7.5.4 apply to the keeping of racing pigeons in urban areas. Clauses 7.5.5 to 7.5.7 apply to the keeping of poultry in rural areas in addition to urban areas
- 7.5.1 Except with the written consent from Council, the maximum number of racing pigeons caged or otherwise that shall be kept in any one property anywhere in any urban areas as defined in schedule 1 shall be 60; providing the owner of such birds is a current financial member of the South Waikato Pigeon Club or Waikato Racing Pigeon Federation or Pigeon Racing New Zealand Incorporated and the birds are kept in accordance with the "Code of Practice for Pigeon Keeping and Pigeon Racing in New Zealand".
- 7.5.2 Any person wishing to keep more than 60 racing pigeons on one property in an urban area shall apply in writing to the Council for a permit or obtain the necessary resource consent for a specified number of birds and shall provide the Council with the necessary information required to make a decision.
- 7.5.3 Any permit issued by the Council pursuant to Clause 7.5.2 may include such conditions, as the Council deems appropriate. The permit-holder shall comply with the conditions of their permit.
- 7.5.4 No person shall keep racing pigeons in an urban area unless they are provided with a pigeon loft that is:
 - (a) Constructed in accordance with the Building Act 2004 if the pigeon loft is over 10 square metres in floor area; and
 - (b) Rainproof and provided with a floor of concrete or other approved material raised 150 millimetres above ground level to which a pigeon run may be attached;
 - (c) Not located within 5 metres of any dwelling (including a dwelling on a neighbouring site), factory, or any other building whether wholly or partially occupied; or within 2 metres of the boundary of adjoining premises;
 - (d) Adequately graded and drained, and kept clean and in good repair and be enclosed with wire mesh or other material to confine the pigeons; and
 - (e) Maintained in good repair, in a clean condition free from any offensive smell or overflow and free from vermin.
- 7.5.5 All effluent or discharge from a pigeon loft or run must:
 - (a) Not be discharged in such a manner as to cause a nuisance;
 - (b) Comply with the Resource Management Act 1991;
 - (c) Comply with the relevant requirements of the Council.
- 7.5.6 If, in the opinion of an authorised officer; a pigeon loft or pigeon run is causing a nuisance, whether continuously or intermittently, the Council may by written notice require the owner or occupier to abate the nuisance.
- 7.5.7 It is the duty of the owner or occupier to abate the nuisance as required by any notice under clause 7.5.6. If the owner or occupier does not abate the nuisance as required by the notice issued under clause 7.5.6, then the appropriate enforcement shall be taken as set out in the Bylaws Administration Bylaw 2017.

7.6 Noise from animal or bird

7.6.1 No person shall keep, or continue to keep, on any premises any noisy animal, bird, or poultry which causes or is likely to cause, a nuisance to any person residing or working in any urban area as defined in schedule 1 of this bylaw.

Endangerment of native fauna

It is widely documented that cats (even pet cats), are predators of native fauna. We argue that this issue is considered more than just a 'nuisance', but in fact a huge threat. Spraying

Cats, particularly unneutered males, are known to spray/urinate to mark their territory. The smell is unpleasant and hard to remove. The scent attracts other cats, which also reply by spraying.

Fighting

Fighting of cats occurs for territory and mates. Yowling during the night and fighting resulting in injuries and trips to the vet is common.

Digging/Defecating

Cats will dig in gardens, in sand pits and even on the grass to defecate. This is certainly undesirable and potentially dangerous due to diseases that can be passed to humans. Zoonotic diseases

Many diseases can be passed from cats to humans and some pose a significant risk to young, immunocompromised and pregnant people.

They have since tried to scare off or reduce numbers but the problem still exists abd they leave forna gew months then numbers return. A few pet ducks would be ok but thats not the case. One of my neighbours with a bordering fence line planted an expensive flowering hedge along our boundary, and then came to me asking me to ensure my stock didn't reach through the batten fence and destroy their hedge. At the time WDC had no bylaw on this situation, whereas some other councils do (eg. Country/rural boundaries should expect stock to reach through batten fences, so responsibility of "planting" neighbours is to plant far enough away from the fence line to avoid stock damage.) Secondly what if the plants are poisonous and stock die as a result of planting close to a boundary? In my situation, we came to an amicable solution, at shared cost, but we could have had a worse outcome, and led to ongoing conflict and cost. I would expect with the popularity of lifestyle blocks in WDC increasing, there could be more issues like this, and "expectations" of landowners could be clarified through bylaws, that would help resolve this.

Please consider adding some measures around cats and responsible ownership to the bylaw. Many councils (approximately 30) have measures in their bylaw to help manage cats. These measures include limiting the number of cats per household, compulsory desexing for kittens over 4 months (unless a registered breeder) and microchipping. All these things help reduce the nuisance that cats can cause, including unwanted kittens. Limiting the number of cats per household is both a nuisance factor for neighbours, and a health issue for both the people and the cats. Microchipping ensures that owned cats can be returned to their owners if they are lost but also enables cat control to safely happen in reserves near populated areas and microchipped cats can be returned to their owners. We highly recommend that you introduce these things. Restricting feeding of cats on public land (or without the permission on the landowner) is also an important measure to reduce feeding of stray cats on public land.

- 4. TCC considers the 2,000m2 size is appropriate and sees no reason to increase the size of an Urban property to 2,500m2.
- 5. The restriction on animal numbers allowed may not still be appropriate: urban area numbers seem a bit high relative to section size so may need reconsideration, particularly if the property size for Urban remains at 2,000m2.
- 6. We agree that a restriction on roosters for both urban and lifestyle is appropriate.
- 7. Council could also consider restricting geese and peacocks, for both urban and lifestyle areas, if being "kept" by a property owner/occupier. They are a nuisance.
- 8. Ducks, pigeons, turkeys, pheasants and quail are generally wild and not "kept"
- 9. Bees and beekeeping are important to nature generally, so need as much encouragement as can be given.

Restrictions on beehive positioning is NOT sensible and indicates a lack of knowledge or understanding of bees by the Council. Beehives need to be positioned for bee health and survival. Often it is not possible to locate hives with a big setback because of stock, crops, tree shading, etc and most neighbours have no problem with bees near a boundary. It is only human behaviour disrupting bees that creates a problem for bees, so maybe Council needs to strongly reconsider the setback concept, giving priority to bees and not inconsiderate NIMBY neighbours.

The existing bylaw allows removal of honey and bee products but not the further processing of such products. It does not make sense that a





registered beekeeper is not able to process honey in an approved facility on their own property, especially if it is rural. This needs reconsideration by the Council.

This causes the horses to panic and can run into humans, as well as accidentally eat a bee that has landed in their feed causes unnecessary vet bills. It is essential that the bylaw consider the character of an area not just it's zoning, because in our rural zoned area there are now 13 houses within half a kilometre of an unlimited number of hives.

Executive Summary

- SPCA supports the mandatory desexing of all cats by four months of age in Waikato
 District Council with exemptions for registered breeding animals, or if a veterinarian has
 determined it would negatively impact the cat's health and welfare. Desexing provides
 welfare benefits to the individual cat and is important for addressing problems with cat
 overpopulation.
- SPCA supports the mandatory microchipping and registration of microchips on the New
 Zealand Companion Animal Register for all cats by four months of age in Waikato
 District. Microchipping and microchip registration can help ensure a lost or injured cat's
 owner can be identified and contacted.
- SPCA recognises the benefits of a limit on the number of cats per dwelling, however, we
 advocate for the minimum number to not be set lower than three cats per dwelling
 without permission from the Council.
- SPCA advocates for cat owners to keep their cats at home or on their property and supports bylaws that facilitate this behaviour.
- SPCA urges Waikato District Council to improve their tracking of nuisance associated with roaming cats including property damage, spraying and defaecating on neighbouring properties, and fighting with other cats causing injuries that then require veterinary treatment.



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Introduction

The following submission is made on behalf of The Royal New Zealand Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (trading as SPCA).

SPCA is the preeminent animal welfare and advocacy organisation in New Zealand. The Society has been in existence for over 150 years with a supporter base representing more than 100,000 New Zealanders across the nation.

The organisation includes 29 Animal Welfare Centres across New Zealand and approximately 60 inspectors appointed under the Animal Welfare Act 1999.

SPCA welcomes the opportunity to submit on the Waikato District Council Keeping of Animals Bylaw- early engagement.

Submission

Below we provide our recommendations for changes to the Keeping of Animals Bylaw 2015.

Define different types of cats in the Keeping of Animals bylaw cat categories

SPCA recommends using the following three categories to describe cats in New Zealand:

- Feral cats do not rely on human activity to survive and are generally located in remote
 areas. Feral cats have a wild temperament and are not suitable as companion animals.
 None of their needs are provided by humans and their population is self-sustaining.
- Stray cats are considered unowned and live near people. Stray cats vary in their sociality and dependence on humans. They may rely on people to some degree, either directly or indirectly, to meet their needs, such as food and shelter. Stray cats can live as individuals or in groups (colonies). Some stray cats are lost or abandoned companion cats, whereas others were born stray.
- Companion cats are considered owned and dependent on people to meet their needs.



These different types of cats form a metapopulation where there is a flow between the subpopulations (McDonald & Hodgson, 2021; Miller et al., 2014). For example, undesexed companion cats can have unplanned litters of kittens that end up living as stray cats. Stray cats that live in rural landscapes and are unsocialised to humans may end up contributing to feral cat populations. Categorising cats as companion, stray, and feral helps determine the options for managing these different sub-populations of cats.

Require cat owners to desex their cats

SPCA advocates for the Keeping of Animals bylaw to include requirements for cat owners to desex their companion cat by four months of age with exemptions for registered breeding animals or to protect the health and welfare of the cat. We have seen a steady increase in councils that pass bylaws to promote more responsible cat ownership (please see Table 1 for more information).

We urge the Waikato District Council to require cats to be desexed to benefit cat welfare and help address problems with cat overpopulation (please see Table 2 for more information).

Desexing provides welfare benefits to the individual cat and helps address problems with cat overpopulation (Farnworth et al., 2013; Joyce & Yates, 2011; Yates et al., 2013). Desexing cats helps reduce the number of kittens that enter shelters and are euthanased (New et al., 2000; Marston & Bennett, 2009; Marsh, 2010).

The traditional age for desexing a cat in New Zealand is from four to six months of age (Farnworth et al., 2013; Orr & Jones, 2019). Kittens typically enter puberty from four to six months of age however, this can occur as early as fourteen weeks of age (three- and one-half months) (Farnworth et al., 2013; Stubbs & Bloomberg, 1995). Therefore, we support the requirement for desexing to occur before kittens enter puberty to help break the cycle of unplanned litters born each year in New Zealand.

Desexing can safely be carried out at an earlier age than the age of four to six months (Howe, 2015; Root Kustritz, 1999; Stubbs & Bloomberg, 1995; Stubbs et al., 1996). Early desexing does not adversely affect the physiological or behavioural development in cats; it is a faster procedure with a quicker recovery time for the kitten (Aronsohn & Faggella, 1993; Bushby & Griffin, 2011;



Howe, 1997; Porters et al., 2015); and reduces the likelihood of some cat behaviours such as spraying, straying, and vocalising later in life (Spain et al., 2004).

Require cat owners to microchip their cats and register the microchip on the New Zealand Companion Animal Register

SPCA advocates for the Keeping of Animals bylaw to include requirements for cat owners to microchip their cats by four months of age. Ensuring microchipping and desexing occur at the same time maximises the welfare benefit of both practices and helps ensure consistency in requirements for cat owners.

Microchipping and microchip registration can help ensure a lost or injured cat's owner can be identified and contacted (Lord et al., 2010; Lancaster et al., 2015). Most New Zealand cat owners allow their cats to roam (Companion Animals New Zealand, 2020; Hall et al., 2016; Gates et al., 2019). Therefore, we urge the Council to set the age for microchipping to four months of age to help ensure kittens benefit from having a registered microchip at a young age.

Reasonable limits on the number of cats per dwelling

SPCA supports reasonable limits on the number of cats per dwelling as this can help ensure an individual cat's welfare needs are met and they experience A Good Life. We consider a limit of two cats per residence as too low. If the Waikato District Council is considering a limit on cats per residence, we encourage the Council to have a permission system for a person to have more than three cats per dwelling.

We encourage the Waikato District Council to include microchipping, desexing, and keeping cats at home (on the owner's property) as criteria for a person to have more than the allowed number of cats.

Keep cats at home to reduce nuisance

SPCA advocates for cat owners to keep their cats at home and supports bylaws that facilitate this behaviour. We urge the Waikato District Council to consider the public health risks, nuisance, and property damage issues related to companion cats whose owners allow them to freely roam from their property.



There are roughly 1.2 million companion cats in 35-41% of households across New Zealand (Companion Animals New Zealand, 2020; van Heezik et al., 2010). Recent studies indicate that most cat owners do not restrict their cats from roaming from their property (Bassett et al., 2020; Companion Animals New Zealand, 2020; Gates et al., 2019). The likelihood of undesexed companion cats contributing to the unwanted population of cats is exacerbated by most cat owners allowing their cats to roam freely.

A cat's physical, health, behavioural, emotional, and mental needs can be met whilst keeping them at home as either indoor-only cats, with access to a secure outdoor enclosure, or with access to a garden with an escape-proof fence.

In addition to being at increased risk of welfare harm from disease, injury, vehicle accidents, and becoming lost, roaming cats can have negative impacts on other people and animals in communities.

Keep track of nuisance complaints

SPCA urges Waikato District Council to improve how they track nuisance complaints associated with cats including property damage, spraying, and defaecating on neighbouring properties, and fighting with other cats causing injuries that then require veterinary treatment.

SPCA is concerned that the true scale of nuisance related to undesexed, and roaming companion cats is not fully communicated to local councils. Our organisation regularly receives emails and calls from the public about cat nuisance (e.g., the neighbour's cat is toileting in their garden). We even have a <u>website article</u> offering advice and tips for keeping a cat out of your garden. However, these strategies place the onus of managing nuisance on those who do not own the cat. Our organisation advocates that preventing nuisance is the cat owner's responsibility.

SPCA is concerned about issues related to the keeping of cats that may be perceived as non-nuisance such as predation on native wildlife and spread of disease. We receive emails and calls related to the harms that members of the public voice about native wildlife predation, and we argue this impacts the person and should be considered a community nuisance. Cats are the definitive host of toxoplasmosis, and exposure to cat faeces in soil, sandpits, litter beds, and



gardens is a risk factor for transmission to people and other animals (Aguirre et al., 2019; Stelzer et al., 2019).

Background

Each year, on average 20,000 cats and kittens come into our Centres. Many of these animals are directly or indirectly (through stray cat populations) a result of an owner failing to desex their companion cat. Our SPCA Centres regularly see the welfare problems related to irresponsible companion cat ownership, including:

- the predictable cycle of unplanned litters of kittens born each year because there are too many undesexed companion cats allowed to breed;
- the number of cats and kittens who are lost or have strayed, and we cannot find their owner because they are not microchipped, or their microchip details are not registered on a national database; and
- the number of cats and kittens that are injured, diseased, and lost or strayed because they are allowed to roam freely from home.

We also know that irresponsible cat ownership can lead to nuisance in communities (e.g., spraying, toileting, fighting), predation on wildlife, and the spread of toxoplasmosis to people and animals including farmed animals and vulnerable native marine mammals (e.g., Hector's and Māui dolphins).

Desexing and microchipping companion cats and keeping them at home are some of the few tools we have for addressing problems with stray cats in our communities. Desexing a companion cat helps prevent unplanned litters of kittens which can end up as stray cats. Having a microchip registered on the New Zealand Companion Animal Register can help us identify an owner to reunite with a lost companion cat that may be living as a stray. Keeping cats at home decreases their likelihood of becoming lost or straying.



The unwanted cat population in New Zealand must be viewed as a public problem, requiring local (and national) policy solutions where the true cost of owning an undesexed and unmicrochipped cat is not an undue burden on New Zealand society. These costs include the costs that shelters and rescues absorb, costs that local councils absorb with managing unwanted cats, and costs of increased protection of vulnerable wildlife.

With no national legislation requiring companion cats to be desexed, microchipped, and their microchip registered, New Zealand needs more leadership from the local government to encourage responsible cat ownership and complement the work done by our organisation and others.

Currently, there are six Councils in New Zealand where cats must be desexed and eight Councils where cats must be microchipped with a microchip registered on the <u>New Zealand Companion</u> Animal Register.

The benefits of more responsible cat ownership.

SPCA advocates for more responsible ownership of companion cats to improve the welfare of cats and to help address the problems with community nuisance, predation, and the overpopulation of stray cats.

Welfare-related benefits of desexing cats

Desexing can reduce the risk of certain diseases, reduce the likelihood of roaming (which can increase risks of harm such as disease and infection, injury, and becoming lost), and increase lifespan. Desexing can also prevent the mortality of unplanned kittens which is often overlooked as a welfare problem.

Table 2: Welfare-related benefits of desexing cats

Decreased risk of reproductive disease

- Mammary gland tumours are common in cats:
 - 16.3% of all tumours are in the mammary gland in an Italian registry, making this the second most common tumour site (Vascellari et al., 2009).
 - 17% of all cancers reported were in the mammary gland in a California registry (1963-1966) making this the third most common cancer (Dorn et al., 1968).
 - 8.2% of tumours in a Swiss feline cancer registry (1965-2008) were mammary gland tumours (Graf et al., 2016).
 - Japanese and Siamese breeds are at increased risk of mammary tumours (Graf et al., 2016; Ito et al., 1996).
- Mammary tumours in cats have a high risk of being malignant:
 - >90% of mammary gland tumours in cats are malignant (Dorn et al., 1968; Hampe &
 Misdorp, 1974; Hayes et al., 1981).



- A more recent study with a Swiss feline cancer registry found that 83% of mammary tumours were malignant (Graf et al., 2016).
- Desexing is protective against mammary tumours in cats:
 - Sexually intact cats have seven times the risk of developing mammary gland neoplasms when they get older compared to spayed female cats (Dorn et al., 1968).
 - Ovariectomy was found to protect against mammary carcinomas but not against benign mammary tumours. Intact cats are seven times overrepresented in the population of cats diagnosed with mammary tumours (Misdorp et al., 1991).
 - Desexed female cats had significantly lower odds than entire female cats of developing tumour/malignant tumour in the mammary gland (Graf et al., 2016).
 - Desexing before one year of age is protective against mammary carcinoma: 91% risk of reduction if desexed before 6 months, 86% reduction if before one year. Desexing after two years increased the risk (likely due to very few cats being desexed after this age) (Overley et al., 2005).
- Pyometra (uterine infection) risk increases significantly with age for female cats (Potter et al., 1991).

Increased lifespan and improved overall health

- Undesexed companion cats have significantly shorter lifespans than desexed companion cats (Hamilton et al., 1969; Kent et al., 2022; O'Neill et al., 2015).
- Being undesexed is a risk factor for cats developing degenerative joint disease (Lascelles
 et al., 2010; Slingerland et al., 2011), which is considered a leading cause of pain in cats
 (Robertson et al., 2010).
- Improved health for both male and female cats in managed colonies may be related to reduced reproduction-related aggression in males (Cafazzo et al., 2019; Finkler et al., 2011).
- Desexed male cats live a mean of 62% longer than undesexed male cats, and desexed female cats live a mean of 39% longer than undesexed female cats (Banfield Pet Hospital, 2013).



- For companion cats over five years of age in an English veterinary database, desexed female cats lived .6 months longer than undesexed female cats and desexed male cats lived 1.8 years longer than undesexed male cats (O'Neill et al., 2015).
- For companion cats over 1 year of age in a California teaching hospital database (Kent et al., 2022):
 - desexed females had a median lifespan of 10.48 years, compared to undesexed females that had a median lifespan of 4.68 years.
 - desexed males had a median lifespan of 9.84 years, compared to undesexed males who had a median lifespan of 3.67 years.
- For companion cats over the age of five years of age in a Pennsylvania database (Hamilton et al., 1969):
 - desexed male cats lived a median of 10.8 years compared to undesexed males who lived a median of 8.6 years. Deaths from trauma and infections were less common in desexed males.
 - male cats desexed before the age of five months, had a median lifespan of thirteen years compared to male cats desexed at six to seven months who had a median lifespan of eleven years.
- Cats at least six years of age and not desexed in an English database were twice as likely to have signs related to degenerative joint disease (Maniaki et al., 2021).
- Desexed stray cats were in better welfare condition compared to intact cats likely due to reduced reproduction-related aggression in males (Gunther, et al., 2018).
- Desexed male and female cats in a TNR (Trap Neuter Return) managed colony were less likely to be injured or have impaired health which may be related to decreased risk of infectious disease, nutritional deficiencies, and stress associated with reproduction (Gilhofer et al., 2019).

Decreased roaming risks

 Intact male cats are at higher risk of traffic accidents, injuries, bite wounds, and disease transmission compared to desexed males (Finkler et al., 2011; Gunther et al., 2015; 2018).



- Roaming (and fighting and spraying) reduced or eliminated in 80-90% of cats (Hart & Cooper, 1984).
- Desexing reduces activity related to territorial behaviour. Authors note cats are less active, which they do not specify includes roaming (Cafazzo et al., 2019).

Improved kitten welfare

- Unplanned kittens contribute to high numbers of animals surrendered to shelters.
 Kittens under the age of six months made up the largest proportion of owner-surrender cats to an animal shelter in Australia; 34% of all owner-surrendered animals were emaciated (Marston & Bennett, 2009).
- Kittens that enter the shelter system because they are from unplanned breeding can
 often be in a poor state of welfare. This is before shelter entry and not related to shelter
 stay. An average of 30% of kittens that came into SPCA Centres are categorised as not
 healthy at intake. Not healthy categories include Dead on Arrival; Unhealthy not
 treatable; Unhealthy treatable (urgent); Unhealthy treatable (non-urgent) (SPCA Intake
 Health Data: Jan 2021-Jul 2023)
- Free-roaming kittens had the highest prevalence of emaciation and thinness, lowest BCS (Body Condition Score) scores, and higher prevalence of severe injury or disability than adults. (Gunther et al., 2018).
- There is high variability among kitten mortality in stray cats, however, at least one study showed 75% mortality before six months, with trauma being the most common cause of death (Nutter et al., 2004).

Welfare-related benefits of microchipping cats

SPCA prefers microchipping as the primary form of identification for a cat because the chip cannot be removed, dislodged, or lost without surgical intervention. Once a cat is microchipped, the 15-digit microchip number and the animal and owner's details can be registered with a microchip registration database, such as the New Zealand Companion Animal Register



(Companion Animals New Zealand, 2018). Microchipping helps ensure a lost cat can be reunited with their owner, which can be especially true during emergencies.

Table 3: Welfare-related benefits of microchipping cats.

Welfare-related benefits of microchipping

- During the 2011 Christchurch earthquake, 85% of owners of microchipped animals were contacted within 3 hours by the New Zealand Companion Animal Register, compared to only 25% of non-microchipped animals reunited with their owners within seven days (Companion Animals New Zealand, 2018).
- 39% of microchipped cats were returned to their owners, compared to 2% returned for un-microchipped cats (Lord et al., 2010).
- 51% of microchipped cats were returned to their owners compared to only 5% of unmicrochipped cats (Lancaster et al., 2015).

The addition of a collar and tag for companion or managed stray cats can provide a visual indication of a cat's ownership/management status and successfully help reunite lost cats with their owners/carers (Alberthsen et al., 2013; Lord et al., 2007, 2010).

Welfare-related benefits of keeping cats at home.

Cats who are allowed to roam from home face numerous welfare risks including threats to their health, consequences of becoming lost or straying, and if not desexed, can contribute to the unwanted kitten population in New Zealand.

Table 4: Welfare-related benefits of keeping cats at home.

Welfare-related benefits of keeping cats at home

Reduced the risk of injury and death from vehicles, fighting with cats and other animals, infectious disease transmission, and ingestion of harmful substances (Bruce et al., 2019; Loyd et al., 2013; Rochlitz, 2003a, b, 2004a, b).



 Reduced risk of disease transmission to people and other animals (e.g., ringworm, Feline Immunodeficiency Virus [FIV]) (Hosie et al., 2009; Stull et al., 2015).

Other benefits of responsible cat ownership

More responsible cat ownership can reduce the negative impacts cats can have including nuisance, predation on native wildlife, and spread of toxoplasmosis to both native animals and pastoral animals. Desexing and microchipping are longer-term term strategies that will address problems with the overpopulation of cats and keeping cats at home can provide immediate local benefits for reducing nuisance such as spraying and toileting on neighbouring properties and reducing predation. Preventing cats from defecating away from home can also contribute to a reduction in the spread of toxoplasmosis to other animals and people.

Table 5: Other benefits of responsible cat ownership

Benefits of responsible cat ownership

- Reduced risk of toxoplasmosis transmission to farmed animals (Aguirre et al., 2019;
 Stelzer et al., 2019).
- Decreased risk of toxoplasmosis transmission to native wildlife (Aguirre et al., 2019).
- Decreased predation on native wildlife (Bell & Bell, 2003; Bellingham et al., 2010;
 Dowding & Murphy, 2001; Imber et al., 2003; Veitch et al., 2011).

Cats pose a significant nuisance problem. Unlike dogs, there is no accountability for owners of cats. Currently cats do not need to be registered, microchipped, neutered, numbers limited or confined to their own property.

Nuisance examples of cats;

Widely documented that cats (even pet cats), are predators of native fauna and decrease biodiversity. I argue that this issue is considered more than just a 'nuisance', but in fact a huge threat.

Cats (even owned pets) raid rubbish bins and eat pet food from other animals, even coming into other people's houses to obtain it.

Cats, particularly unneutered males, are known to spray/urinate to mark their territory. The smell is unpleasant and hard to remove. The scent attracts other cats, which also reply by spraying.

Fighting of cats occurs for territory and mates. Yowling during the night and fighting resulting in injuries and trips to the vet is common.

Even if cats are not partaking in the above nuisance behaviours, the presence of cats on someones property who does not want them there is in itself a nuisance. Cats often invite themselves into peoples homes whether they are wanted or not. Could be an issue for people with cat allergies.

Cats will dig in gardens, in sand pits and even on the grass to defecate. Certainly undesirable and potentially dangerous due to diseases that can be passed to humans. Many diseases can be passed from cats to humans and some pose a significant risk to young, immunocompromised and pregnant people. Diseases include Cat Scratch Fever, Internal parasites, Ringworm, Salmonella, Fleas, Toxoplasmosis and Giardia.

Unlike dogs, there is no accountability for owners of cats. Cats do not need to be registered, microchipped, neutered, numbers limited or confined to their own property. The responsibility of cat owners needs to legislative rather than just mere suggestions or guidelines to validate the cat nuisance issue.

Recommendations;

Numbers of cats owned/kept/looked after/fed (including stray cats), should be limited. With multiple cats living in one household there can be health concerns for both cats and human occupants.

Pet cats should be microchipped. Lost cats can be returned to their owners. Pet cats should be neutered (unless a registered breeder) to prevent unwanted cats, which too often end up as dumped cats/strays.

Cat confinement should be investigated and discussed with an aim to move towards the 'indoor cat' concept.

If stray and feral cats are disposed of, there will be less kittens/cats becoming part of the cat population. Obviously stray and feral cats are also contributing to the nuisance behaviours mentioned previously too.

I currently house 4 hens and they pose no problems to any of my neighbours that I've been made aware of.
